FOCUS Marines Foundation was created in 2010 by Marines who served in the Corps years ago. Following active service, they lived productive and rewarding lives. These Marines, many of whom saw combat in Vietnam, understood firsthand the issues of transitioning from military to civilian lives and were determined to help this new generation of Marines and veterans

FMF developed a week long program called FOCUS, held west of St. Louis, Missouri. The program is conducted four times each year with a maximum of 25 per class. Participants arrive on Saturday and depart the following Saturday. Sunday is spent building class energy and cohesion. Monday – Wednesday focuses on "Who Are You? & Who Do

To understand how effective the FOCUS program is, please see the Graduate Testimonials. To date, nearly 1,160 post-9/11 veterans from the Marine Corps, Navy, Army and Air Force have attended FOCUS. Marines and Navy Corpsmen comprise majority of each class. Attendees have ranged in rank from Private to Colonel, and in ages from 21 to 67. They came to FOCUS from throughout the U.S. These veterans return home with new-found self-respect and purpose.




The Navy officer who became a legend among the 6th Marines

Lt. Joel Boone was awarded the Medal of Honor for extraordinary heroism while helping the wounded on July 19, 1918. (Naval History and Heritage Command). On June 2, 1918, during Germany's spring offensive on the Western Front, the enemy encountered a newly arrived company of Marines — and they, unlike a French unit pulling back to more defensible ground, were marching straight toward the enemy. The outcome

nia, on Aug. 29, 1889, Boone got his rine Artillery Regiment of the Marine the Cacos Rebellion in Haiti. It was officer for the 13th Marine Company.

By April 1917, Boone was serving aboard the battleship USS Wyoming (BB-32) when the United States declared war on Germany and in June of that year he was temporarily promoted to full lieutenant. Boone faced his first challenge on June 9, when the 6th Marines' regimental aid station was demolished by enemy shells and was bombarded again on the 10th, killing 10 Marines and wounding many more. On June 25, he followed a battalion pressing against machine gun positions, establishing advance dressing stations under continuous shell fire. For his performance throughout the intense fighting at Belleau Wood, Boone was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross.

The final turning point of World War I on the Western Front began on July 14 as the German army tried to force its way across the Marne River and on to Paris — only to be stopped there by the French and American army On July 19, Surg. Boone left the shelter of his field station and into an open field southeast of Vierzy, near a cemetery on the road south. Under a heavy barrage of large caliber shells, Boone calmly but swiftly traversed the scant cover to recover wounded Marines, apply tourniquets and dress wounds. Casualties were so heavy that he used up his dressings and supplies, so he commandeered a motorcycle and drove to the rear through a blitz of explosives and gas, then, as his citation states, "returned quickly with a sidecar load." Such were the day's casualties that his medical supplies were again used up, so "A second trip under the same conditions and for the same purpose, was made by Surg. Boone later that day." Somehow he survived and dozens of front-line witnesses testified to the exploits of the naval officer who became a legend among the 6th Marines.

Promoted to lieutenant commander in September, Boone made it through the war to the armistice on Nov. 11, 1918. His life-saving actions on July 25 were recognized by the Navy, which later saw Boone awarded the Medal of Honor. That, along with the DSC, six Silver Stars, Bronze Star with "V," two Purple Hearts, French Officier de la Légion d'Honneur and Croix de Guerre with two bronze stars, added up to his ultimate status as the most decorated medical officer in the U.S. Armed Services. Boone continued his naval career through World War II and Korea, one of the few Americans to have served in four conflicts. He represented the American medical forces on the deck of battleship Missouri when the Japanese surrendered on Sept. 2, 1945. He also served in the White House physician to Presidents Warren G. Harding, Calvin Coolidge, Herbert Hoover and, briefly, Franklin D. Roosevelt.

But then we entered the 1980's where things started to rapidly change. Although I loved being a Marine, I only served four years active duty and then got out to start a new season of my life as a wife, and eventually a mom. Women were discharged from active duty if they were pregnant and I witnessed some of my friends end their service because of it. That started to shift in the late 1970's so by 1980, women were allowed to stay in when pregnant. There still are a lot of complications in today's force with custody of children when the mother deploys, or even goes to extended training, but more women are making careers as Marines than ever before. Within six months of leaving active duty, I joined the Marine Corps Reserves and enjoyed being affiliated again. My MOS was in Administration, so I always had a billet wherever I went. Everything started to change for women Marines around this time. We were now permitted to wear Cammies and boots, something I loved very much! And we finally got to go to the rifle range and fam-fire. I loved that too! Our PFT changed for the third time since I joined to be more aligned with the male PFT. I was fine with that too! And more opportunities were opened for women with the MOS's, and I was proud of that.

During my 24-year career, I served in two active-duty units, and seven reserve units from west coast to east coast, mostly infantry units, long before women were allowed to be in an infantry unit. I deployed with 25 th Marine Regiment for Desert Storm as their Regimental S-1 Chief and

was the only woman in the regimental staff. Within a year after returning from that deployment I was promoted to 1 st Sergeant. Because of my gender, the Marine Corps would not allow me to stay with the infantry regiment, so they gave me orders to logistics group where women were allowed to serve in leadership billets. Several years later, I was invited by HQMC to return to 25 th Marine Regiment to be their Headquarters Company First Sergeant and make history for women in leadership billets. I declined that offer and accepted orders to another logistics company in New Jersey. I was the company 1 st Sergeant of two logistics units before being promoted to Sergeant Major and assigned to 6 th Motor Transport Battalion, which some of the old- timers had issues with that.

As I reflect on my 50 years as a Marine, I feel quite blessed. I joined the Marine Corps knowing very little about the Marines, yet eager to be one. I knew little about the history of the Marine Corps outside of what we were taught in boot camp. The 200 th birthday celebration in 1975 was my first experience of sharing such pride with fellow Marines and I began to truly feel part of this family. I graduated boot camp and MOS school and was acclimating to my first duty assignment in 1975 and the buzz was contagious and energizing about the Corps' 200 th birthday celebration. I was bursting with pride to be part of this great organization, and the enthusiasm propelled me to lean into this new identity that was now mine. I earned the title Marine, and now I have a responsibility to uphold all its traditions and customs like all those who came before me.

During my 24-year career, the PFT became the easiest thing the Marine Corps asked of me. I was a trailblazer of sorts for all the changes that were occurring to integrate women into combat MOS's. To meet those MOS minimum standards, women had to adapt and overcome all the myriads of changes with the PFT, weapons training, Crucible, billeting, uniforms, etc. Fifty years later, I stand prouder knowing I am part of an elite organization who has embraced the changes for women Marines and welcomed us as equal. As women, not Lady Leathernecks, we've been challenged to meet physical and mental requirements that have stretched us beyond what most women could ever imagine with a focus on strength and endurance. I love the line, "All women were created equal, then some became Marines."





Last year, I was able to raise \$2500.00 which was divided evenly between two NH veteran charities: Homeland Heroes and Warriors at 45 North. It is my hope to exceed these amounts this year.

There are two ways to donate to Pennies for Pounds: a flat rate donation, or a chosen amount per pound resulting in a donation based on the total amount of weight I lift at the competition. While donations by check are accepted, donations through Eventgroove provide clear and transparent record keeping for all parties, assisting in alleviating concerns potential donors may have. 100% of the money raised goes directly to the charities.

With your help, I can reach my goal of exceeding my prior two years donations. 100% of funds raised go to the selected veteran charities and none of it is used for the competition or my expenses.



three years at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. Despite being stationed apart, John and Dom remained in close contact throughout their active-duty service and beyond. Their bond only deepened with time. John stood as an usher in Dom's wedding, and they continued to check in with one another regularly over the decades—a reflection of the enduring Marine ethos: no Marine left behind, in war or in peace.

Today, Dom is a member of Pound 141, Connecticut Pack, and John proudly serves in Pound 306, North Carolina Pack. This summer, John will celebrate his 91st birthday—a testament to his strength, resilience, and unwavering Marine fighting spirit. A former member of the National Marine Corps League Staff, John stepped aside in recent years to make way for a new generation of Marines, though he remains active and proclaims 35that he "never sees himself slowing down." In the lead-up to the National Convention in West Virginia, John—already a Pedigreed Devil Dog (PDD)— learned that Dom had submitted his Advancement Form to go up for PDD. Without hesitation, John took the initiative to become a Dog Handler and arranged to be in Dom's platoon, standing by his side once again after more than seven decades of camaraderie. This story is more than just a friendship—it is a living example of the Marine Corps' unbreakable spirit of brotherhood, loyalty, and Semper Fidelis. 





WOUNDED WARRIOR REGIMENT

WWR Fact Sheet

District Injured Support Coordinators & Field Support Representatives

District Injured Support Coordinators (DISCs) and Field Support Representatives (FSRs) are an integral part of the Wounded Warrior Regiment's (WWR) support structure. They act as a conduit to Marine Corps, Veterans Affairs (VA), and civilian resources for Marines recovering away from a military installation or transitioning to veteran status. DISCs are Marine reservists and FSRs are contract support geographically dispersed to provide assistance and community liaison where needed.

The goal of DISCs and FSRs is to return well adjusted wounded, ill, or injured (WII) Marine veterans to their communities with the knowledge and skills to self-advocate and assist other WII Marines.

What Services do DISCs and FSRs offer?

- Outreach through calls or face-to-face contact with WII Marines and their families requiring assistance.
- Assistance with accessing VA and community resources.
- Facilitate veteran medical care through VA patient advocates or OIF/OEF Coordinators.
- Information on family and caregiver support services (i.e. respite care, scholarship opportunities, counseling support).
- Access to education and employment resources in their local communities (i.e. resume development, interview skills, network/ employment opportunities, and application completion).
- Support in working with representatives from medical facilities, the VA, legal authorities, businesses, and non-profit organizations.
- Immediate access to the WWR's medical section and VA for psychological health resources and support, including referrals to local resources to ensure WII Marines receive timely and appropriate care.








Regardless of the situation, the Marine Corps has an answer for almost everything.
