Only 81 Days to Christmas!

And so it begins with 81 days till Christmas The 2021 Toys for Tots Campaign will be on it's way in Maine. Boxes like those below will need to be assembled, distributed and finally collected so



that the needs of children will be met for the holiday. The Marine Corps League of Maine will take on this

task and will be seeking to place boxes in local businesses all over the State.

Toys for Tots began in 1947 as the brain child of Marine Corps Reserve Major Bill Hendricks. Actually it was his wife, Diane, who was the real inspiration. She had a few handcrafted dolls and asked Bill to deliver them to an agency that supports children in need.

When Bill reported back to his wife that he could not find such an organization, she instructed him to "start one!". Maj Hendricks and the Marines in his reserve unit in LA collected and distributed 5,000 toys i n1947.

Seeing such successful community engagement in 1947, the Commandant directed all Marine Reserve Sites to implement a TFT campaign transforming it into a national community action program in 1948.

The Marine Toys for Tots Foundation, an IRS recognized 501 (c) (3) not-for-profit charity, was established in 1991 at the behest of the Marine Corps to help run and support the Marine Toys for Tots Program.

The Foundation raises funds, purchases toys, provides promotional and support materials, manages all funds raised and donated, solicits corporate support, educates the public, and handles day-to-day operations.

Presently, the Marine Toys for Tots Program distributes an average of 18 million toys to 7 million less fortunate children annually.



medicine and drug allowance while constantly nursing them. He risked infection from contagious diseases while in a rapidly deteriorating state of health, eventually losing his life. He was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor.

Cook Detachment provide assistance to all Marines, FMF Corpsmen and their families as well as conduct events and ceremonies together in fellowship and camaraderie in order to preserve the history and traditions of the United States Marine Corps and support our local community

Joseph Charles Messina Jr., (73) of Monson, Massachusetts passed peacefully August 8, 2021 surrounded by his three sons, Joseph Charles Messina III, Joshua Michael Messina, and Jason William Messina. Joseph was born in Ware, MA to the late Joseph and Marie Messina on April 23, 1948.

In 1968 Joseph left Monson MA for Parris Island on his journey to become a United States Marine, an event that guided the remainder of his life. As proud as Joseph was of his own accomplishment, he took great pride when his son Joseph and later his grandson Jadon followed in his footsteps in becoming Marines. After being honorably discharged from the Marine Corps, Joseph worked at Milton Bradley and Sullivan's Trucking before landing at the United States Post Office. Joseph began his career at the filled his time by carrying on his love for the Marine Corps by being active in the Marine Corps League at the local and national level, at his peak holding the office of National Assistant Vice Commandant as well as the National Seat for the New England Division.

Joseph took great pride in his service to the Marine Corps League and especially his planning of the yearly convention for the New England Marine Corps League over the past several years. Joseph was recognized for his service and devotion to the Marine Corps League earning the distinction of Marine of the Year in 2004, the Distinguished Service Award, and the Distinguished Citizen Award. In addition to the regular Marine Corps League operations, Joseph found great enjoyment with the Military Order of the Devil Dogs

Post Office loading and unloading bags of mail and later became a letter carrier. Joseph retired from the Post Office after 34 years of service, the majority of which was spent delivering mail out of the Indian Orchard branch

Jim enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1960 in Boston, MA. After graduating from Parris Island, he spent two years on sea duty aboard the USS Lake Champlain and USS Essex. Duty included recover operations of Commander Alan Sheppard's first U.S. manned outer space flight and served during the Cuba Blockade in 1961. Jim served in Vietnam as operational deployment casualty field reporter until 1967. He also served as a Military Police and Correctional Field with duty in Hawaii and New Hampshire. First Sergeant Laskey retired from 20 years of service as while stationed at Marine Corps Officer Candidate School in 1980.

A member of the Marine Corps League for 53 years, Jim served many capacities includ-

Why join the Marine Corps League?



The next important factor to consider is, if they come how will you keep them coming back? At the Connecticut Department Convention in June, Mike Monaco from the Peter P. Monaco Detachment spoke on how they recruited and how they retained their members. When a member comes to a meeting they are there sometimes with the member that invited them or alone. I remember my first meeting and my friend brought me but he was a Detachment Officer and sat up front and I was alone. I looked at the clock on the wall and pleaded with God to let the time pass so I could get out of there. Mike had a great idea and that was assign a new member a mentor to sit with. Someone from the same era, same MOS, someone with common ground that the new member would have a connection with. That member in turn should introduce the new member to his or her friends at the meeting and maybe also they could make arrangements to ride together to the next meeting. The one thing I would suggest is to keep it simple. Just one meeting at a time don't look for the new member to commit to a life membership. I remember when I joined it was several months before I wanted to go to a meeting and that was because of a new friendship I developed so be prepared to invest time into a new member, they are worth it. We all started as new members. Look back and see how far you have come. See what you have accomplished and as a group look at what we have given to others. I often tell others when they are talking to people about recruiting and they are talking to perspective members, please don't say we are a veterans organization and we help veterans. Spell it out tell



them what we do all of it big and small. When someone asks for us to reach out to talk to a Marine alone in hospice care is just as important as anything else we do. Many of you have a motto on your e-mail signature line, "Once a Marine Always a Marine", it's not just a good quote it's a way of life. Look around your neighborhood, at cars you pass on the highway and you will see that there is no other branch of service that is as proud and vocal about it than the Marines.
