FEBRUARY 3RD 1943 THE USAT DORCHESTER



On February 3rd 2025 Division Chaplain Jane Deptula, hosted an event at The Cornerstone of Faith United Methodist Church, Along with the Bucci Atwood Detachment in Coventry Rhode Island. On Feb. 3, 1943, the U.S.A.T. Dorchester carrying 902 service men, merchant seamen and civilian workers was sunk in the cold Atlantic.

tragedy and heroic conduct of the four chaplains. "Valor is a gift," Carl Sandburg once said. "Those having it never know for sure whether they have it until the test comes." That night Reverend Fox, Rabbi Goode, Reverend Poling and Father Washington passed life's ultimate test. In doing so, they became an enduring example of extraordinary faith, courage and selflessness. The Distinguished Service Cross and Purple Heart were awarded posthumously December 19, 1944, to the next of kin by Lt. Gen. Brehon B. Somervell, Commanding General of the Army Service Forces, in a ceremony at the post chapel at Fort Myer, VA. A one-time only posthumous Special Medal for Heroism was authorized by Congress and awarded by the President Eisenhower on January 18, 1961. The special medal was intended to have the same weight and importance as the Medal of Honor .

The Chapel of the Four Chaplains recognizes people throughout the year for selfless acts of kindness or humanitarian deeds. Many Marine Corps League members have been recipients of these awards. When I came into the

league I saw there was an award for The Marine of the year, and I wondered how could someone possibly be deserving of that? Then a few years ago I found myself receiving an award from the Chapel of The Four Chaplains. I look at awards a little differently than most in that they should inspire people to do better every day. To strive for higher goals and purpose. If someone gave you this award then you should strive every day to show you deserve it. I have two particular awards I am proud of Marine Of The Year, which drives me every day to get up and do all I can to serve and advance the Marine Corps League every day, one foot in front of the other and never quit. The other is the Four Chaplains Award which addresses how I work with, treat, and serve my fellow man. This Award is a little harder to honor and be good at. It is my hope that the legacy these Chaplains left behind would inspire us step up and be better examples of what all of us should be. So when our test in life comes we find that we too possess the Valor, strength and love we need to succeed.

HAMSAL, which stands for “Help A Marine, Save A Life”, centers around taking care of yourself, as well as taking care of each other.

Last year I attended many Division Conferences upon request and presented a PowerPoint that included a little bit about my story, Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR), mental health and substance use disorder. QPR covers suicide awareness and prevention, and I know that we do not talk about this enough. What’s that you say, you don’t like talking about these uncomfortable topics? Well, I am here to tell you that those days are gone. We are our brothers and sisters keeper, whether you know or it like it. We cannot do this alone so we will do this together.

I was honored to speak at the New England/Quad States Conference and if you missed it, you are in luck. I am available to present to your Department and your membership to help spread the word. My HAMSAL presentation can also be found on the MCL Library under the member section. As a retired Police Officer and Marine Corps veteran in recovery, I understand about suffering in silence and fighting that stigma, especially within the First Responder and military/veteran community. WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

"During World War I, Opha May Johnson was the first of 305 women to be accepted for duty in the Marine Corps Reserve on 13 August 1918. Most women filled clerical billets at Headquarters, Marine Corps to release male Marines qualified for active field service to fight in France. Other women filled jobs throughout the United States. On 30 July 1919, after the war was over, orders were issued for separation of all women from the Corps.

Twenty-five years later, women were back to "free a man to fight." The Marine Reserve was established in February 1943. Before World War II ended, a total of 23,145 officer and enlisted women reservists served in the Corps. Un- like their predecessors, women Marines in World War II per-

formed over 200 military assignments. In addition to clerical work, their numbers included parachute riggers, mechanics, radio operators, map makers, motor transport support, and welders. By June 1944, women reservists made up 85 percent of the enlisted personnel on duty at Headquarters, Marine Corps and almost two-thirds of the personnel manning all major posts and stations in the United States and Hawaii. Following the surrender of Japan, demobilization of the Women's Reserve proceeded rapidly, but a number of them returned to service as regulars under the 1948 Act. "

The 1948 Act is when Women Marines became a permanent part of the regular Marine Corps on 12 June 1948 when Congress passed the [Women's Armed Services Integration Act \(Public Law 625\)](#), but they had already proved themselves in two world wars.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

LIVING THE MARINE CORPS VALUE OF HONOR

The Marine Corps' core value of courage is the inner strength that enables us to do what is right, to adhere to a higher standard of personal conduct, and to make tough decisions under stress and pressure (USMC.MIL)

Courage is the ability to confront fear, pain, danger, uncertainty, or intimidation despite feeling apprehensive. It is not the absence of fear, but rather the recognition of fear and the willingness to move forward anyway. True courage often manifests in various forms, each uniquely challenging and significant in its own right.

Courage, by definition, is something that is hard to do. If you do something without fear, then you are not being courageous – you're just being you! To be courageous, you have to be pushing through fear and uncertainty.

The story of the four Chaplains, a Catholic, a Jew, and two Protestants, stands out as an incredible act of courage to God, their fellow service members, and to our country. During World War II, the US Transport Ship *Dorchester* was part of a three-ship convoy traveling across the icy waters of Newfound-



During that brief time, through the chaos and pandemonium, the four Army chaplains set out to do their work. Quickly and quietly, they spread out among the soldiers. They tried to calm the frightened, tend to the wounded, and guide the disoriented toward safety. Witnesses of that terrible night remember hearing the four men offering prayers for the dying and encouragement for those who would live.

When a soldier couldn't find his life jacket, one of the Chaplains took off his own life vest and gave it to the frightened

man. The four Chaplains comforted the fleeing men and prayed with them. One survivor recounted, "As I swam away from the ship, I looked back. The flares had lit everything. The bow came up high and she slid under. The last thing I saw, the four Chaplains praying for the safety of the men." Another survivor testified that "the Chaplains had climbed on the keel, and they were standing arm in arm" before they slid into the icy waters. Of the 902 lives onboard, only 229 survived. That night, the four Chaplains passed the ultimate test; in doing so, they became an enduring example of extraordinary faith, courage, and selflessness. We may never be faced with the decision to go down with the ship to save others, but we can sacrifice time each day to be kind to others, listen to others, or give a call to others.

The Four Chaplains Memorial Foundation continues to honor the legacy of the Four Chaplains with its Legion of Honor Awards program. This program recognizes selfless service in many forms throughout our communities, schools, veteran service organizations, and neighborhoods.

The Legion of Honor Award Program consisting of six honorable awards, publicly recognizes and pays tribute to outstanding members of society whose lives model the giving spirit and unconditional service to community, nation, and humanity without regard to race, religion, or creed exemplified by the Four Chaplains. This program has recognized many of our Marine Corps League & Auxiliary Members who have

I typically have to adjust many of them, correcting information and sometimes even transferring the information to more current NOD revision. So let me review the process quickly with you...

- Detachment NOD's are to be filled out by your Detachment Chaplain and sent to the Dept Chaplain (for now, Dept Chaplain is me - contact info above)
- The proper NOD Form to be used is revision copyright date 2021 - let me know; I will forward to you
- Once I receive your NOD, I will process to National and will cc You, your Det Commandant and Det Paymaster, providing I have their contacts.
- It is the responsibility of the Det Paymaster to process the proper transmittal to National for roster updates.

If anything is unclear, please reach out to me for clarification.

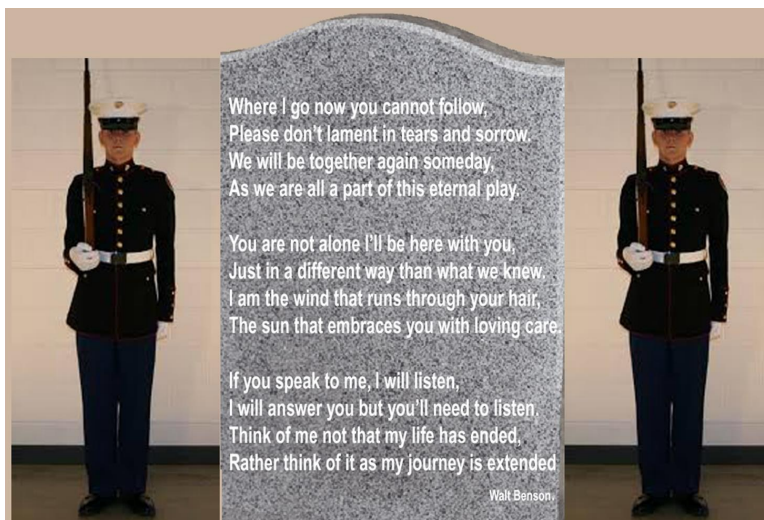

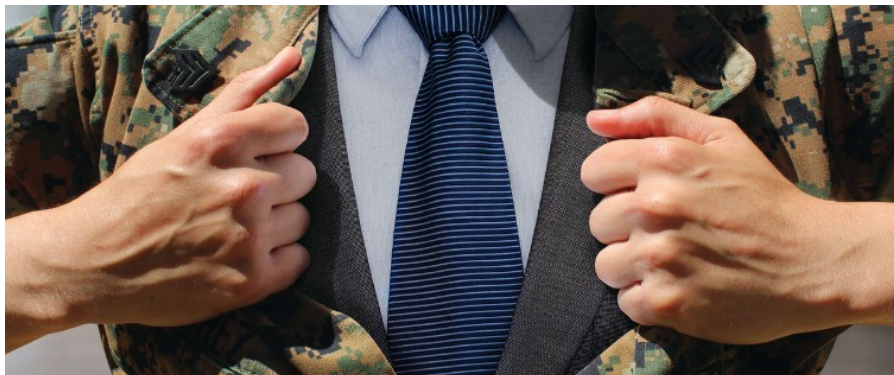

WOUNDED WARRIOR REGIMENT

WWR Fact Sheet

District Injured Support Coordinators & Field Support Representatives

District Injured Support Coordinators (DISCs) and Field Support Representatives (FSRs) are an integral part of the Wounded Warrior Regiment's (WWR) support structure. They act as a conduit to Marine Corps, Veterans Affairs (VA), and civilian resources for Marines recovering away from a military installation or transitioning to veteran status. DISCs are Marine reservists and FSRs are contract support geographically dispersed to provide assistance and community liaison where needed.

The goal of DISCs and FSRs is to return well adjusted wounded, ill, or injured (WII) Marine veterans to their communities with the knowledge and skills to self-advocate and assist other WII Marines.

What Services do DISCs and FSRs offer?

- Outreach through calls or face-to-face contact with WII Marines and their families requiring assistance.
- Assistance with accessing VA and community resources.
- Facilitate veteran medical care through VA patient advocates or OIF/OEF Coordinators.
- Information on family and caregiver support services (i.e. respite care, scholarship opportunities, counseling support).
- Access to education and employment resources in their local communities (i.e. resume development, interview skills, network/employment opportunities, and application completion).
- Support in working with representatives from medical facilities, the VA, legal authorities, businesses, and non-profit organizations.
- Immediate access to the WWR's medical section and VA for psychological health resources and support, including referrals to local resources to ensure WII Marines receive timely and appropriate care.

Who They Support

- Marines transitioning to veteran status
- Reserve Marines
- Marines recovering in remote locations away from military or federal resources
- TDRL/PDRL Marines

Where They are Located

DISCs and FSRs are geographically dispersed across the country and are generally collocated with VA-operated medical centers, vet centers, and outpatient clinics offering primary and specialized care.
