MARINES

I've seen comments

regarding those of us who saw combat and those Marines who didn't. I copied a piece written by Jason Mangone, a Lieutenant of Marines who didn't see combat that I think might be of interest to *** ALL *** of us: How I Let Go Of The Embarrassment I Felt For Having Never Served in Combat.

A few months ago, I read Phil Klay's book, "Redeployment" — a collection of a dozen short stories. One of its unifying themes was that young people, and young men in particular, seek validation through combat. There are myriad consequences to facing combat — some good, and others bad. Others who never face combat, but expected to, are often left with intermingled senses of regret and embarrassment. There's a selfishness in the sentiment: service is about "We." Validation, potential regret, and its attendant embarrassment are about "Me.

"From 2006–2010, I was a Marine infantry officer. I commanded platoons on three deployments. Most of my contemporaries — that is, Marine infantry officers serving in the late aughts — have been in combat. I've never been shot at, blown up, or been in contact with the enemy in any sense whatsoever. I am a veteran, but I am not a combat veteran.

Accepting this took some time: it went from a lived reality to a source of shame, to something I merely acknowledge today as a fact of my life. This simple reckoning has allowed me to recollect my service with straightforwardness and grow as a person.

While I was still in, other Marines knew the battalion I was in, and they'd know I'd been in Iraq when it was calm, then went on a MEU, then went to Haiti. I've seen a lot written about the pressure to get a Combat Action Ribbon — the unofficial sign that you'd really done something while you were deployed. And while I always revered my Marines and senior leaders who had one — perhaps too much so for a time — when I was around other Marines, it didn't matter too much that I never had one. If new Marines who joined my platoons were skeptical of my leadership because I'd never been in combat, I never felt it, and like to think I eventually gained their trust through competence.

I felt embarrassment most sharply after I'd gotten out. People expected that I'd been in combat, and I thought I would have been, too. I never lied about it, but as a brand-new civilian, I'm not proud to admit that I did offer ambiguous responses to questions like "What did you do?" I'd respond with: "I was a Marine, an infantry officer. I was in Iraq." I'd just let it linger as though I was a salty vet who just stayed mum about the experience because there were some things I just didn't want to talk about. I'd let people keep their assumptions about what my response meant, as though I might be less of a person if they knew the truth. At a certain point, I flipped entirely. Just about any time I talked about my experience as a Marine, I almost reflexively said — and, sometimes still do say —Yeah, but I never really did anything. I was never in combat."4

I don't know what I'm supposed to say when people ask me what I did or where I served. I've just settled on being comfortable with some facts about what I did and who I am. I was not in a unit that got shot at. Many others in my line of work were, but I wasn't. I like to think I would have handled it just as well as all my buddies, but I have no idea

I got out after four years while the war in Iraq was winding down, and Afghanistan was getting messier. I could have stayed in and sought a unit deploying to Afghanistan, and it's likely that I would have seen combat. But I didn't. So, there's some arbitrariness, and a little bit of personal choice — even if it was a choice of omission — in the fact that I'm not a combat veteran.

Most importantly, any sense of regret I have for not getting shot at is laden with a deep, perhaps sinful, moral failing. I did three deployments, and there were around 120 Marines in the two platoons I led, none of whom were ever hurt or killed. Given the time I served, and the job I had, that's nothing but a blessing. If I'd been in combat on any of my deployments, I probably would have been fine — while many officers have been hurt and killed in Iraq and Afghanistan, the brunt of that burden sits with enlisted men. And so, the self-validation I might have gained in combat would have likely come at the cost of my Marines. Shame on me forever feeling embarrassed.

All that's proper is to shut up and count my blessings. I'm exceedingly proud that I served. I look back, and though I did nothing heroic, I smile widely, knowing that I loved my Marines deeply. I feel comfortable that my service honored a sacred covenant with them, even if that bond was never faced with nor forged in the ultimate crucible. I'll never know what sort of growth combat may have led to, but I'm okay with who I am today.

I matured, as I learned practical lessons from dozens of Marines, hundreds of mistakes, and a few major failures. I became a man of deeper integrity, if only from the fortunate contagion of befriending several people of the highest character; and having had a job in my early 20s where living one's values is the clearest path to success. Because I served, I'm a more complete husband, friend, brother, son, and citizen; and I know I'll love and guide the child we expect in July more wholly.



We lay wreaths and flags be beside the honored graves,


With each we say a prayer and remeber what they gave.

QPR covers suicide awareness and prevention, and I know that we do not talk about this enough. What's that you say, you don't like talking about these uncomfortable topics? Well, I am here to tell you that those days are gone. We are our brothers and sisters keeper, whether you know or it like it. We cannot do this alone so we will do this together.

I was honored to speak at the New England/Quad States Conference and if you missed it, you are in luck. I am available to present to your Department and your membership to help spread the word. My HAMSAL presentation can also be found on the MCL Library under the member section. As a retired Police Officer and Marine Corps veteran in recovery, I understand about suffering in silence and fighting that stigma, especially within the First Responder and military/veteran community. ${\rm IWO~JIM~FLAG~RAISING}\\ {\rm 80^{~TH}~ANNIVERSARY~COMMEMORATION~CEREMONY}$

Two Iwo Jima survivors, Joe Caminiti, of Bristol, and Peter Senick, of New Haven, attended the 80th Anniversary Commemorative Ceremony. Members of the Marine Corp League from across the State were present to honor the two living Iwo Jima Survivors. It was also an honor to welcome 102-year-old WW2 Woman Marine veteran Corporal Dottie Dee.





The event took place in Davidson Hall at Central Connecticut State University. New Britain Mayor Erin Stewart served as the master of ceremonies for the event. The guest speakers included Ron Welch, Brigadier General, U.S. Army Retired, Commissioner of the Connecticut Department of Veterans Affairs, and Brigadier General Omar J. Randall from Headquarters Marine Corps. Special guest speakers included U.S. Senator Richard Blumenthal, the Mayor Jon Trister of Newington, CCSU President Zulma R. Toro.

The nephew of Dr. George Gentile, the man behind the creation of the Iwo Jima



Survivor's Monument, Mark Gentile, spoke about his uncle and the founding of the Iwo Jima Association that built the Monument in New Britain. This monument is special in that it has volcanic rocks from the island of Iwo Jima imbedded into the base. The names of the 100 people from Connecticut who were killed in the Battle of Iwo Jima were read at the close of the ceremony. Marines Joe Caminiti and Peter Senick are the last known Iwo Jima Survivors in Connecticut. The raising of the flag on Mount Suribachi is one of the most iconic photographs of all time and emblematic of the courage, honor, and commitment of all U.S. Marines.


LIVING THE MARINE CORPS VALUE OF HONOR

It is the Easter season. During this time, I like to reflect on the hope and joy it brings and to gain a deeper understanding of the meaning of the resurrection and victory over death, the power of forgiveness, and of new beginnings.

For others, it is a time to celebrate Passover, which commemorates freedom from slavery, oppression,

and reminds people to return to God's ways.

Both of these invoke the profound, spiritual and emotional forces drive us to our God, who made us and to whom we belong. Like our connection to the military community, we also belong to the heavenly community. We are often reminded that our time here is short. This is a real-life story that happened in mid- March of this year. A friend and a sister Ma-





rine veteran lost her husband, also a Marine veteran. His passing was sudden and shocking. Both were in their early 50's, with teenage daughters. He and his girls served with the local fire department. While doing a service project for a disabled Marine veteran, he dropped dead. No warning, and no underlying conditions.

The family and community are devastated. At the funeral Mass, the wife gave a powerful testimony to their 30 years together. It was a message of a full and beautiful life together. A life of love, and dedication and of hope for life to go on. In the hardest moment of her life, she said 'I will see you again, but I have to finish the work you started here with the girls."

This is a beautiful Easter story. Through the tragedies of life, when our darkest days are upon us, our Lord is there for us. Let us be there for each other. Let us forgive and renew relationships. Let us care about others, be helpful to others, and let us reach out to those who don't always deserve our kindness but need it the most.

May you and your loved ones enjoy a beautiful Easter full of peace and joy.







WWR Fact Sheet

District Injured Support Coordinators & Field Support Representatives

District Injured Support Coordinators (DISCs) and Field Support Representatives (FSRs) are an integral part of the Wounded Warrior Regiment's (WWR) support structure. They act as a conduit to Marine Corps, Veterans Affairs (VA), and civilian resources for Marines recovering away from a military installation or transitioning to veteran status. DISCs are Marine reservists and FSRs are contract support geographically dispersed to provide assistance and community liaison where needed.

The goal of DISCs and FSRs is to return well adjusted wounded, ill, or injured (WII) Marine veterans to their communities with the knowledge and skills to self-advocate and assist other WII Marines.

What Services do DISCs and FSRs offer?

- Outreach through calls or face-to-face contact with WII Marines and their families requiring assistance.
- Assistance with accessing VA and community resources.
- Facilitate veteran medical care through VA patient advocates or OIF/OEF Coordinators.
- Information on family and caregiver support services (i.e. respite care, scholarship opportunities, counseling support).
- Access to education and employment resources in their local communities (i.e. resume development, interview skills, network/ employment opportunities, and application completion).
- Support in working with representatives from medical facilities, the VA, legal authorities, businesses, and non-profit organizations.
- Immediate access to the WWR's medical section and VA for psychological health resources and support, including referrals to local resources to ensure WII Marines receive timely and appropriate care.




